**Carpentry**

Citizens depend on law enforcement officers to protect their lives and property. There are many different options when considering a career in Law Enforcement.

Police officers have general duties, including regular patrols and responding to calls for service. They direct traffic, investigate burglaries, and perform first aid.

University and public school police are examples of special police agencies.

Some police officers specialize in diverse fields, such as fingerprint identification. Others work with special units, such as special weapons and tactics (SWAT).

Sheriffs and deputy sheriffs enforce the law on the county level.

State police officers arrest criminals Statewide, patrol highways, and enforce motor vehicle laws and regulations.

Detectives are investigators who gather facts and collect evidence

for criminal cases.

FBI agents are the Government's principal investigators, responsible for national security.

From traffic stops to emergency situations, Law Enforcement is a demanding and rewarding career.

Job Outlook Money Matters

Law Enforcement is an attractive career because the job is challenging and involves personal responsibility. A security-conscious society and concern about drug-related crimes contributes to the increasing demand for police services. The benefits are also appealing; in many agencies, an officer may retire with a pension after 25 years of service, allowing them to pursue a second career.

Career: Law Enforcement Officer

Job Description: Duties of a Law Enforcement Officer include conducting investigations, making arrests, testifying in court, responding to calls, taking necessary action at the scene of crime or disturbance, and completing reports, forms and routine paperwork.

Salary: \$34,410 - 112,031 annually

Education Needed

To begin a career in Law Enforcement, candidates must be U.S. citizens, at least 21 years of age but less than 37 years of age at the time of appointment, and must meet rigorous physical and personal qualifications. Physical examinations for entrance into law enforcement often include tests of vision, hearing, strength, and agility. Eligibility for appointment usually depends on performance in competitive written examinations and previous education and experience. In larger departments, where the majority of law enforcement jobs are found, applicants usually must have at least a high school education, and some departments require one to two years of college coursework. Because personal characteristics such as honesty, sound judgment, integrity, and a sense of responsibility are especially important in law enforcement, candidates are interviewed by senior officers, and their character traits and backgrounds are investigated. Before their first assignments, officers go through a period of training. Candidates should enjoy working with people and meeting the public.
